- A test of your emergency equipment
- A social event
- A family event
- A learning opportunity

- A chance for newbies to get on the air
- A chance to get some good food!
- A place to tell our story
- All of the above

Field Day ain't....

.... Visiting a club field day and standing around drinking their coffee and getting in the way!

FD can be done on many levels

- Home
- Mobile
- Club effort
- Family camping trip
- An emergency exercise
- Contest operation

Per the ARRL, the objective is to work as many stations as possible..... and to learn to operate radio gear in abnormal situations in less than optimal conditions.

Field Day problems I have seen


- Pushy guests

- Inexperienced operators damaging equipment


Field Day problems I have heard of

Been there, done that:

- No gas
- Missing radio power cable
- Forgot the microphone
- No coffee.....

Preparation

- Download ARRL package!
- There are sections on:
 - Rules
 - Safety
 - Publicity
 - Logging
 - Entry submission

And a lot more...

- Make a written plan
- Make a site map
- Round up gear
- Build antennas
- Set up logging and duping
- Make assignments
- Make checklists for future use

Computer issues

- Select software
- Configure software
- Train operators
- Provide for backups
- Have backup computers(More on this later....)

Bonus Points

- W1AW CW bulletin (Record it!)
- Message to SM or SEM
- Alternative power
- Media Publicity
- 100% emergency power
- Public location

- Message handling
- Satellite QSO
- Educational activity
- Site visit by elected government official
- Site visit by an agency representative, (Red Cross, Salvation Army, local Emergency Management, local law enforcement)

GOTA

- Any class A or F operation
- Bonus points for GOTA operators
- Coach points
- Study the rules carefully it gets complex!

Publicity

- Must be planned in advance
- Appoint a PIO You likely have a member with experience
- Plan for good visual impact




Entry Categories

- Class A Club/non club portable. 3 or more persons set up specifically for field day
- Class A battery 5 watts or less, battery power
- Class B 1 or 2 person portable
- Class B- Battery

- Class C Mobile
- ■Class D home stations
- Class E home stations, emergency power
- Class F EOC

Computer Logging

- N3FJP Software is well regarded and inexpensive. http://www.n3fjp.com/
- Network version is available. [If you network, see if your computer wonk can set up a live sections worked display]



-Bands-

- All bands
- VHF/UHF can be very effective
- Most activity on 20/40/80
- 10/15 are often neglected CALL, don't listen all of the time!

Exchange

Callsign, class and section

- "...3 Alpha, Western Washington"
- "...1 Bravo, Sierra Charley Victor"
- "...1 Echo, Echo Bravo"
- "...1 Charlie, East Texas"
- "...9 Alpha, Orange"
- "...1 Delta, San Joaquin Valley"

Strategy

- Sit and Squawk"
 Or
- "Search and Pounce"

Field day is a free-for-all

- Dive into pileups
- Get in and get out
- The bands will be jammed. Don't worry about it
- Timing is everything

Examples of what you will hear on the air....

[You will hear good operating and horrible operating. Please be kind to the newcomers, especially on Sunday morning!]

- Alligator
- Bad fill
- Non standard phonetics 1
- Non standard phonetics 2
- Non standard phonetics 3
- "You are"

- Does not give call
- Demands to get off "his" frequency
- You are a DUPE
- Parallel contacts
- "Station calling me, call again"

Planning!

Set goals

- Work all states?
- Work all sections?
- Make a contact on all bands?
- All participants make at least ten contacts?
- Get the new troops on the air?
- Make ten CW contacts?

Make assignments for:

- Safety officer This is IMPORTANT!
- All bonus point categories
- Medic with First Aid kit
- Media Relations
- Set-up
- Food
- Equipment
- Food

- Antennas
- Scheduling
- Computers
- Food
- Tear down
- Clean up
- Garbage cans and garbage removal
- Toilet facilities
- Food
- Food!

Neat stuff that will make life easier!




Tag both ends of all cables with length











Other Preparation

- Contact the local police department in advance. Explain what is happening and invite them to visit. [Hint: Mention food]
- Post "Emergency Communications exercise" signs

Generator and power management

- At least two generators
- Have procedure for powering down during changeover
- Grounding
- Noise shielding
- Rain shelter
- Cables
- Surge suppressors
- Fuel storage

- Lights use LEDs to reduce load
- Schedule gas shut downs to avoid loping
- No hot fueling
- No gas lanterns in fuel area
- Take fire extinguishers, shovels and axes and have them near the generators

Safety!

- Inspect entire facility before operation
- Have a meeting before starting to answer questions, etc.
- Rope off areas to control access
- Mark cables and ropes with surveyor's tape
- Put coax that is on the ground in PVC pipe

Free Advice...

- I suggest limiting operation other than GOTA to club members. Have membership forms available
- Post an operator schedule for each station
- Make up a sign for each station and post it next to the radio – Call sign and exchange

Prepare FD binders for each station

- FD rules
- Equipment references
- Equipment block chart
- Section list
- Emergency phone numbers and information
- The *exact* FD location in case you have to call 911
- Member cell phone numbers
- Operating schedule
- Manual log and dupe sheets

- Assemble and test stations in advance do a 'clean table' layout
- Have manuals for all equipment on paper or in PDF. If in PDF, put on logging computer desktop
- Tag all coax over ten feet long with length on both ends
- Use fluorescent wireties from Harbor Freight
- Do not clip the ends from wireties

- Establish a 2M simplex frequency for communicating in the FD area
- Keep notes of any problems and issues
- Have an after-action meeting to get suggestions for next year
- After breaking down, inspect every inch of the area looking for tools, trash, etc.

Up to \$2,000,000 in Coverage Each Year

The basic ARRL Club Liability Insurance policy provides up to \$1,000,000 in coverage for each occurrence and up to \$2,000,000 in aggregate coverage each year. Higher limits can be obtained, if necessary, for an additional premium. Please contact the Program Administrator directly for additional limits and premiums.

There are no deductibles to satisfy prior to receiving benefits.
